Division 3A Philipino Luzon District

Each year, Kiwanis International challenges all its clubs to celebrate one day of service. At the beginning of every administrative year, Kiwanians worldwide gather to render selfless service to those in need – especially children. Our District Governor, Mario Marasigan, and our Division 3A Lieutenant Governor, Francis Villegas, organized and motivated 13 clubs to

share their time and talents to prepare for the event to aid those severely impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The district theme of Kiwanis One Day was "A Legacy of Children's Welfare Through Virtual Health Fair".

Our goal was to emulate the *Plan of Kiwanis* in serving the children. All 13 clubs worked together and jumped at the opportunity to share their time and talent.

The schedule for our Kiwanis One Day event was as follows:

Welcome address of our division Lieutenant Governor. Inspirational message from District Governor-Elect Johnny Domino. Next, we had a guest speaker who discussed leadership qualities. We followed with our service program:

So, what happened at our service event?

A.We held an art contest for the children. COVID-19 pandemic prohibited them from attending any public face-to-face gatherings. We gave them a challenge. We invited the children, to participate in an art contest to help them express the impact of being locked down for almost two years. Art manifests psychological conditions and emotions, including boredom, depression, and anxiety. We gave them one week to submit their entries. The contest's theme was "What COVID Did to Me, My Family, My School, and Community."

2 categories: Group A – ages 7 to 12 & Group B – ages 13 to 20. We awarded cash prizes for first, second, and third places.

- **B.**Health professionals were on hand to administer blood pressure and pulse rate readings to attendees. We advised those with higher-than-normal readings to see doctors in government hospitals or clinics; we gave some people vitamins. They were excited at the prospect of learning how to take control of their health and were thrilled to receive tips on maintaining a healthy diet.
- **C.** There were 20 minutes of physical fitness for all who could participate. Everyone learned simple exercises as well as creative anti-COVID activities that anyone could do at home.
- **D.** Everyone received goody bags to take home. They included face masks, face shields, kilos of rice, cans of sardines and corned beef, noodles, biscuits, bottled mineral water, fresh eggs, vitamin C, multi-vitamins for babies, slippers, bottled alcohol, and bath soap.

It was a successful day! Everyone in our division helped to achieve a common goal in serving those less fortunate.

How did we enhance the **IMAGE** of Kiwanis with this event? We worked with our government and community leaders, extended the venue, the chairs, tables, security, and that stayed until the project ended. marshals We conspicuously displayed our 13 club banners and KOD tarpaulin the day before the event, we invited another organization - Grand Singko of Manila Philippines Eagles- to better help the community. As a result, others will recognize our Kiwanis name, and our good works will enhance our and commitment to our community and people. image Lieutenant Governor Francis did an excellent job by having a reporter cover our event in the People's Tonite newspaper released days after the project. A nationwide newspaper gave Kiwanis International an amazing service image - report an international pandemic could stop us! not even

How did we <u>INSPIRE</u> people and our 13 Clubs? Everyone had joy in their hearts and smiles on their faces. Because of this we motivated more participants to join us.

What was the **IMPACT** it created?

Everyone benefitted from our event - donations came in daily we did not have to beg and plead for them because people wanted to help others. Everyone joyfully gave their time and resources to serve. Those we served were excited and happy especially when taking part in the health screenings and learning how to adopt healthier lifestyles.

What was the **INVESTMENT**?

The event's cost was P186,105.00 (US\$3,606 and CA\$4699), which included transportation and venue preparation. Our event was successful because of the full cooperation and support of our Club Division 3A members – even we did not expect the outcome we received!

It was indeed a manifestation that Kiwanis is here to serve –




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Kiwanis Club of Eye Of The Tiger

December has finally arrived, and with it comes an abundance of colorful lights, vibrant wreaths and a bunch of family parties. Most of these celebrations are inspired by Christmas and Hanukkah, the two major religious holidays celebrated by Christians and Jewish believers, respectively, in America. But those aren't the only religious holidays this month.

Here are 12 holidays with a little explanation on each.

Dec. 6: Saint Nicholas Day — Christian: This holiday honors the birth of Saint Nicholas, the saint who serves as a role model for gift-giving and is commonly known as Santa Claus,

Dec. 8: Rohatsu (Bodhi Day) — Buddhist: This holiday celebrates the historical Buddha's decision and vow to sit under the Bodhi tree until he reached spiritual enlightenment. It's celebrated through meditation and is embraced similar to how Christians celebrate Christmas to honor Jesus Christ.

Dec. 8: Immaculate Conception — Catholic: In the lead-up to Jesus' birthday celebration on Christmas, Catholics celebrate the day of Immaculate Conception to honor his mother Mary who they say was preserved from original sin.

Dec. 10 to 18: Hanukkah — Judaism: This is the eight-day Jewish festival of lights, which celebrates the Maccabean revolt in Egypt. Eight candles are lit with a menorah to honor the holiday.

Dec. 12: Feast Day of Our Lady of Guadalupe — Catholic: This is a primarily Catholic holiday celebrated by Mexicans and Americans of Mexican descent that honors the reported appearance of the Virgin Mary in Mexico City, according to Interfaith Calendar.



Dec. 16: Posadas Navidenas — Christian: This is a primarily Hispanic Christian holiday that commends Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem to give birth to Jesus.

Dec. 21: Solstice — Wicca/Pagan: Solstice is the point in the year "when the earth is most inclined away from the sun. It is the most southern or northern point depending on the hemisphere.


Dec. 25: Christmas — Christian: Christmas is a primarily Christian holiday that celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ.

Dec. 26: Zarathosht Diso (Death of Prophet Zarathustra) — Zoroastrian. Zoroastrians honor the death of their prophet, Zarathustra, who founded Zoroastrianism, one of the world's oldest monotheistic religions.

Dec. 27: Feast of the Holy Family — Catholic: Catholics use this day to honor Jesus, Mary and Joseph.

Dec. 28: Holy Innocents Day — Christian: Christians solemnly honor the deaths of children killed by King Herod, who was attempting to kill Jesus.

Dec. 31: Watch Night — Christian: For Watch Night, Christians will thank God for the safety they received during the year.



2022 is the Year of the Tiger according to Chinese zodiac. This is a Year of Water Tiger, starting from the 2022 Chinese New Year on Feb. 1 and lasting to 2023 Lunar New Year's Eve on Jan. 21. The Tiger ranks third in the 12-year cycle of the Chinese zodiac signs. The Years of the Tiger include 1914, 1926, 1938, 1950, 1962, 1974, 1986, 1998, 2010, 2022, 2034. (Are you A Tiger?)

Tigers, considered to be brave, cruel, forceful, and terrifying, are the symbol of power and lordliness in Chinese culture. In ancient times, people usually compared emperors or kings with the tigers. Tigers are also considered as a patron deity for children and parents will prepare the shoes and hats with tiger designs for their babies.

The Chinese zodiac Tiger sign entitles people born in the Years of the Tiger to be natural leaders. They are adventurous, ambitious and have a strong sense of justice, but maybe also a little arrogant and impetuous.

Kiwanis International is ready to help open new clubs and strengthen clubs that are struggling. KI employs two staff members who only focus on club opening efforts. These staff members provide support from site selection to organizational meetings – as much or as little as districts want or need.

In addition, Kiwanis International President Peter Mancuso has assembled a team of qualified volunteers who are ready and
